## Introduction to The Sermon on the Mount

- o See handout, "The Sermon on the Mount and Christian Ethics" by P.J. Long.
- Chapter 6 reads like a reflective, stream of conscience (lower case "C") commentary
- o How does Bonhoeffer interpret the Sermon on the Mount?
  - Is the Sermon on the Mount a set of ideals to recognize your sin and fall back on grace or a call to fix your eyes on the ethical target of the Christian walk?
- After completing his theological studies, Bonhoeffer serves a German-speaking congregation in Barcelona, Spain, from 1928–1930. (Bonhoeffer's time at Union Theological Seminary in New York is from 1930–1931.)
  - What we observe is a developing theologian being confronted with dramatically different circumstances that lead him from stiff pacifism in Berlin (that seems to hold throughout *Discipleship*) to a willingness to take on moral guilt in order to best love those around him (we will see this development in Dietrich's *Ethics*). Note in his writings on the Sermon on the Mount how Bonhoeffer swings heavy toward a call to strong nonviolence and, even more, *affection* for one's enemy, which we will dive into deeper below. Does anything other than external circumstance change for Dietrich in his final years?
- Compare/Contrast these ethical systems:
  - Immanuel Kant's Categorical Imperative (18th-century German philosopher)
    - "Act only according to that maxim by which you can at the same time will that it should become a universal law."
    - "So act as to treat humanity, whether in your own person or in another, always as an end and never as only a means."
  - Bonhoeffer's writings on the Sermon on the Mount:
    - Necessity of relationship / personhood / union

"Do not quench the Spirit.

Do not treat prophecies with contempt but test them all;

hold on to what is good, reject every kind of evil.

May God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through."

1 Thessalonians 5:19-23

# Chapter 6, The Sermon on the Mount "...but I say to you..."

Bonhoeffer's Organization of the Sermon on the Mount:

The Great Claim: No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the

other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other.

(Matthew 6:24)

The Great Call: But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be

given to you as well. (Matthew 6:33)

• Matthew 5 (the seen, "the extraordinary")

- o The Beatitudes
- o The Visible Church-Community (Salt and Light)
- o The Righteousness of Christ (and the place of the Law)
- o Personal Ethic / Household Code
  - Christian Unity
  - Sexual Purity
  - Integrity
  - Retribution
- o Love / Affection for Enemy
- Matthew 6 (the unseen, "the simple")
  - The Hidden Life
    - Holiness
    - Prayer
    - Faith
  - o Call to serve only one Master
  - o Call to not worry
- Matthew 7 (the set apart)
  - o The church as the ones set apart
    - In the way we judge
    - In the way we are judged
  - o The Challenge of the Conclusion
    - Will you choose the wisdom of heaven?
