The Beginning of the End of the World and The Wonders of the Lost Sea Discussion Questions

"In our world, said Eustace, a star is a huge ball of flaming gas."
"Even in your world, my son, that is not what a star is but only what it is made of."
Consider the following passages: Psalm 19:1-4 and Luke 19:39-40
Are stars and stones anything more than the matter they're made of?

Lewis insinuates that he wrote the Chronicles of Narnia so that "by knowing [Aslan] in Narnia for a little, [we] may know [him — with his name here on Earth] better there [i.e. on Earth]." Recall that Lewis intends us to suppose there's a world like Narnia, and then imagine how Jesus might act and be present in such a world. Lewis has some ideas about what Jesus is like.

- 2. Are there ways you have come to know or understand Jesus better thru Lewis's imaginings in Narnia?
- 3. Does Lewis represent Jesus well in ways that help us see him better portrayed as Aslan?
